Dear Mr. Hollis:

I have just been informed by the Bureau that ALEXANDER HESS who, until recently, was the Military Attache of the Czech Legation in Washington, D. C. and identified by Corby as a Soviet Agent, departed from the United States with his wife on February 27, 1946 from New York City aboard the M.S. Gripsholm for Le Havre, France. Both he and his wife are carrying Czechoslovakian Passports and their ultimate destination is Czechoslovakia via overland.

It is reported that the M.S. Gripsholm will stop enroute at Cobh, Ireland and Plymouth, England. HESS is not expected to return to the United States, but his wife advised INS (Immigration and Naturalization Service) she expected to return to the United States as a native born American citizen.

A confidential source advised that the major portion of HESS' luggage contained nothing pertinent. It was noted, however, that HESS had in his possession a brown briefcase 12 by 16 inches which he guarded carefully.

The above is being furnished you for your information. I am also advising H. A. R. Philby of MI-6. In the event you receive any information regarding his activities on the continent I would appreciate your keeping me informed.



Following is text of Commission's interim report.

Pursuant to order in Council F.C.411 dated February 5th 1946, we have been conducting investigation thereby provided for having commenced our sittings on Wednesday February 13th 1946. We have now reached a stage in hearing of evidence which permits us and renders it advisable for us to make an interim report. The evidence establishes that a network of under cover agents has been organised and developed for purpose of obtaining secret and confidential information particularly from employees of departments and agencies of Dominion Government and office of High Commissioner of U.K. in Canada.

The evidence reveals that these operations were carried on by certain members of staff of Soviet Embassy at Ottawa under direct instructions from Moscow. The person directly in charge of these operations was Colonel ZABOTIN, Military Attache of Embassy, who had had active assistants in this from Lt. Colonel MOTINOV, chief assistant Military Attache, air Lt. Colonel MOGOV assistant Military Attache, Major SOKOLOV, of staff of Commercial Counsellor of Embassy, Lt. ANGELOV, one of the secretaries of the Military Attache, as well as other members of staff of Military Attache all of whom, as well. as agents whom they employed in pursuance of their activities, were, in interests of secrecy, known by under cover names.

Meanwhile however it is obviously desirable that lease possible grounds for activities should be afforded and in circumstances arrest of Primrose and normal action against him might prove embarrassing to Canadian authorities. I have discussed matter with Robertson and we are inclined to think that in light of these recent developments view expressed in Procedure 194 should now be modified to extent that if Director of Public Prosecutions feels case against Primrose is possible and provided postponement can be accepted on ?other grounds action should be delayed until rather nearer the time when Commission can report.

I would in any case suggest Canadian authorities be given as much notice as possible in the event decision being taken to proceed against him.

To. 496. February Tird, Minister of Justice to-day issued the following communication, which he had just received from Counsel to the Royal Commission of Enquiry, <u>BEGINS:</u>

- 1. Since the Commissioner, on our advice, recommended you should be requested to issue orders for interrogation and for that purpose detention, of certain persons, a considerable amount of additional evidence oral and documentary has been placed before the Commissioners which confirms the serious nature of the disclosures on which (orders for) interrogation were based.
- 2. Orders have been made to date under Order-in-Council F.C. 644 dated the 6th day of October 1945 and passed under the Provisions of the War Measures Act and continued under the Provisions of the National Emergency Transitional Powers Act 1945, for interrogation of 11 men and 2 women, and it is apparent that it may be necessary to request that additional persons may be interrogated under similar Orders.
- 5. A great deal of evidence is still to be placed before the Commissioners and reasons for proceeding in camera become more apparent every day.
- 4. The enquiry is proceeding as rapidly as possible, especially considering the difficult circumstances under which the work is being done (it obviously must be done with the Erectest discretion) and the Commissioners desire to make a

report thich will contain at least some of their findings within as short a time as possible, which, however, as appears as present, cannot be less than two or three weeks from now.

- 5. The Commissioners feel, however, and have both orised us to advice you that in their opinion the evidence has not advanced to the stage where in interim report should now be made. They do think, however, that it should be possible to report upon the completion of the evidence now in contemplation, as above, as soon thereafter as that is physically possible, leaving such further matters as may later have to be dealt with for subsequent report. This is as matters appear to the Commissioners at the moment. It may be that as a result of evidence not yet heard the above proposed procedure might prove to be inappropriate.
- 6. The Commissioners have authorized us to state, notwithstanding their Order that their proceedings be conducted in camera, the information communicated to you in this letter may be made public at once if you see fit to do so. Statement ends.


