The meeting was requested by Mr. Pollard to inform all concerned of the reorganization within the Manpower and Immigration Department to cover Olympics - 76. He tabled the attached letter covering these changes. He also wanted to determine what technical procedures would be required to convert the information presently on tape into a format acceptable to CPIC. This being a technical question, the matter was explained further by Mr. Street and Mr. [REDACTED]. After some discussion, it was agreed by Supt. Long, Mr. [REDACTED] and Mr. Street that the best way to resolve this problem was by having a computer programmer from the Manpower and Immigration Department seconded to the Security Service Data Processing Branch for a period of time necessary for the proper conversion and maintenance of all data on tapes, in such a way that on July 1, 1975, the tapes would be placed on-line on the CPIC system. Further maintenance from that date on would be made by terminals only. It was agreed that further arrangements would be made by the two departments involved.

It was pointed out that the conversion to be handled by computer technicians had no direct effect on the data itself, in other words, the users, Immigration and RCMP personnel will still have to validate the information they want to store to determine if this information is up-to-date and if there is sufficient data to make these records meaningful. It was suggested that it would be an opportune time to assess the quality of the records, bearing in mind the potential responses in common names if no specific information such as date of birth are recorded.

The opportunity was again taken by the Chairman to further explain the CPIC system as it exists today, taking into consideration the Property File which will be released on November 7, 1974. It could well be that certain areas [REDACTED]

may well help the police involvement in finding the necessary solution if full use is to be made of the CPIC System. It was explained that a possible way to cover all areas of concern could be to have a "Control" centre at key entry points where different computer terminals could be located side by side and manned by Immigration, police and External Affairs personnel. The Chairman expressed a belief that all are concerned with the same matter, and it was suggested that the above terminal concept may well be the answer. It was also suggested by the Chairman that Immigration

and Police CPIC terminals could be obtained without any difficulty, but the matter of recruiting terminal operators would have to be considered in the near future. With regard to External Affairs computer, no one at the meeting was in a position to supply any up-to-date information on its development and if whether or not terminals would be made available to departments outside External Affairs.

For the sake of clarification, the word "terminal" means a computer device similar to an electric typewriter which can access a computer system, create, query, modify or remove a record. In the CPIC System they can also communicate with any other terminal.

At the suggestion of the Chairman and to help all concerned understand the CPIC System, it was suggested that those interested could attend a CPIC Orientation Course. I have completed arrangements in this regard, and a course is now scheduled for 9:00 a.m., November 15th next. We can only accommodate 20 persons, and would appreciate representation from all Departments involved. We would be interested in receiving the names of your participants as soon as possible.

The meeting was informed by Mr. Redmond and the Chairman that CPIC had almost completed the promised modifications and some testing had started. CPIC anticipates completing their work before the end of the current year. It was again mentioned that a terminal would be made available to Immigration Department for testing purposes by the end of this year, if necessary.

Mr. Pollard expressed his concern about equipment, such as scanners that may not be used after the Olympics and was wondering what coverage would be made after the Olympics.


The Chairman expressed his regrets about not being able to arrange a tour of an operational police centre where CPIC terminals are being utilized. I will not schedule this tour until after the CPIC Orientation Course on November 15th.


Some discussion took place concerning individuals that could be presently recorded by both Immigration and RCMP. It was agreed that the situation should resolve itself during the conversion period when the data would be closely examined by each Department. Duplication will no doubt be erased.


I am prepared to accept all requests for a CPIC Orientation Course that may assist everyone in this regard. Some arrangements have already been made with the Olympics Co-ordinator (RCMP) for such a presentation, and tentative arrangements were made with the D.D.G. (Ops.) Security Service, for a similar presentation.

This letter will confirm that Mr. Street received from CPIC documentation from the CPIC Reference Manual covering common data fields in the Persons File.

SUBJECT / OBJET

The 1976 Olympic Games will become a reality within six weeks. The month of July will be one of intense activity for many departments. Several key federal figures will attend or officiate at the Games, thus public awareness of federal involvement in the Games will no doubt rise to a peak. We therefore anticipate a sharp increase in the number of inquiries directed to the Olympics - Federal Liaison Unit from government as well as outside services. In order to improve our ability to react quickly and efficiently to such inquiries, it would be extremely useful if departments involved in Olympics-related activities could provide us with the following for each activity.

- area of responsibility:
i) brief description of the activity
ii) latest estimated costs (dollars and man-years) broken down between in-program and incremental costs
iii) name and telephone number of the departmental officer in charge.

Les Jeux olympiques de 1976 deviendront une réalité dans six semaines. Le mois de juillet sera un mois d'activité intense pour de nombreux ministères. Plusieurs personnalités fédérales importantes assisteront aux Jeux ou y rempliront des fonctions officielles; ainsi, la sensibilisation du public à la participation fédérale aux Jeux atteindra sans aucun doute un point culminant. Nous prévoyons donc une augmentation marquée du nombre des demandes de renseignements adressées au Groupe fédéral de liaison pour les Olympiques par les services du gouvernement ainsi que par les organismes extérieurs. Afin d'améliorer notre aptitude à répondre rapidement et efficacement à ces demandes de renseignements, il serait extrêmement utile que les ministères qui s'occupent d'activités ayant un rapport avec les Jeux olympiques nous fournissent les renseignements suivants à l'égard de chaque activité.

- sphère de responsabilité:
i) brève description de l'activité
ii) coûts estimatifs les plus récents (en dollars et en années-hommes) ventilés par affectations budgétaires normales et affectations additionnelles
iii) le nom et le numéro de téléphone de l'agent compétent du ministère.

- controversial or sensitive issues

i) identification of potentially controversial or sensitive issues

In short, our objective is to prepare for reference and briefing purposes a directory as comprehensive as possible of all the Olympics-related activities where, directly or indirectly, the federal government is involved or has responsibilities.

It might be possible for some departments to prepare this information before the proposed target date, however for those with more extensive involvements it is hoped that this proposed document be made available no later than June 30, 1976, in order to allow us to achieve our objective.

En résumé, nous nous proposons de préparer aux fins de référence et d'information, un répertoire aussi complet que possible de toutes les activités afférentes aux Jeux olympiques dont s'occupe directement ou indirectement le gouvernement fédéral ou à l'égard desquelles il a des obligations.

Il se pourrait que certains ministères puissent fournir ces renseignements avant la date limite proposée; cependant, pour ce qui est de ceux qui jouent un rôle considérable, nous espérons que le document demandé sera fourni au plus tard le 30 juin 1976 afin de nous permettre d'atteindre notre objectif.

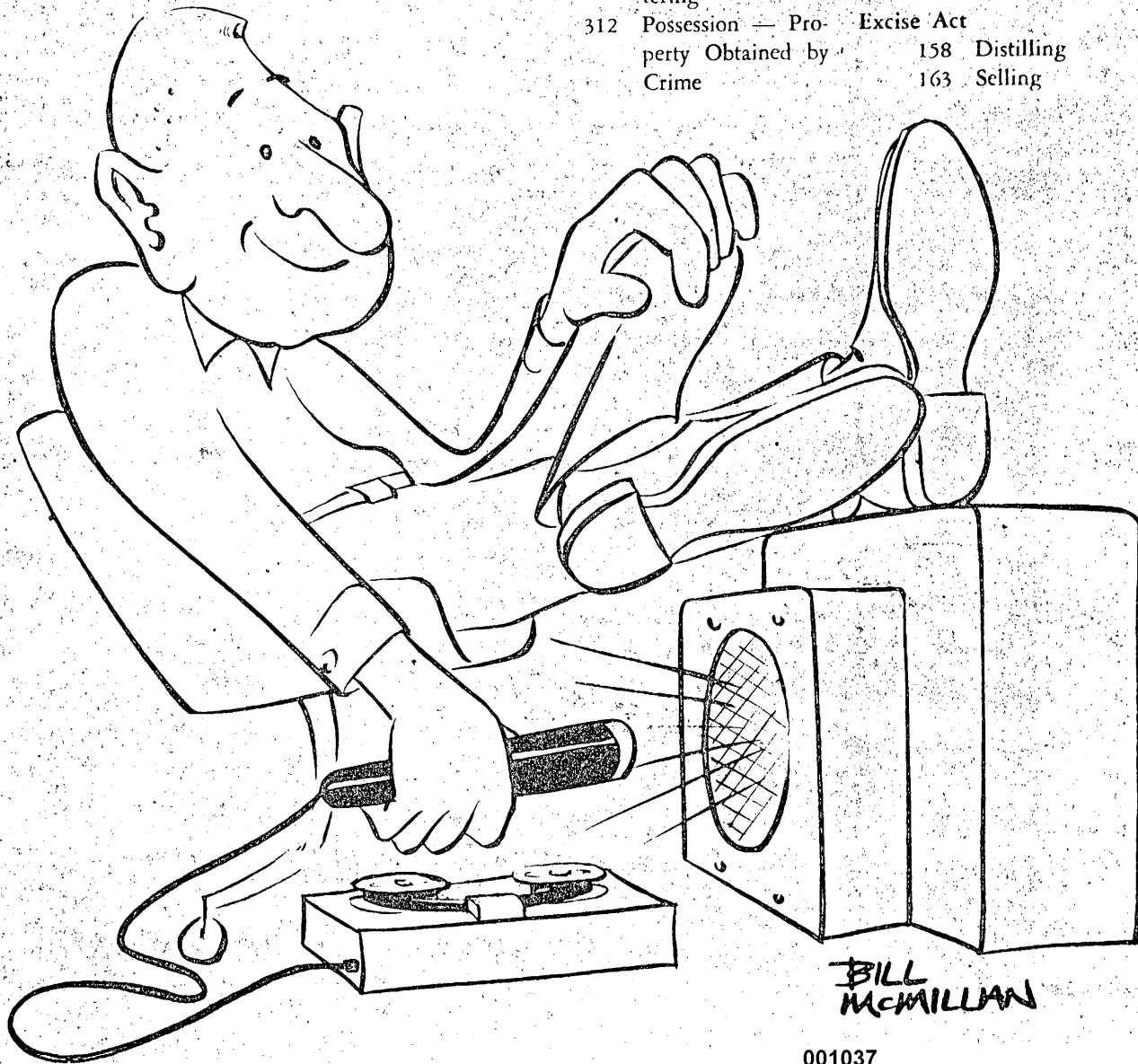

During a recent review of the progress being made in respect of a Casual Translator program to meet OPS (SERVICES) commitments for the 1976 Summer Olympic Games period, it became quite obvious that if our Casual Translator assistance is to be expected to provide a satisfactory service, they will of necessity require access to dictionaries in the various languages they will be called upon to translate. It must be appreciated that Casual Translators, by and large, will have no previous formal training or experience in this kind of work and will, understandably, have a need for reference material. The very nature of their work and the pressures under which they will be required to perform their duties will preclude the luxury of consultation with other linguists, etc. Intelligence translated by our Casuals will undoubtedly be of a timely nature and require immediate attention and action. Accuracy of translations must remain paramount.

2. We have taken into account dictionaries already in possession of our various OPS (SERVICES) units nationally. However, we find ourselves seriously lacking in those languages we normally do not encounter and which have been identified by the Divisions as languages to be encountered prior to and during the Olympics period. For this reason, I would request that a sum of approximately \$600.00 be made available from Olympic funds in order to purchase this most necessary reference material.

3. We have tentatively identified our requirements as follows:

I-621 RE: ESTIMATES OF SURVEILLANCE REQUIREMENTS -
1976 OLYMPICS - (IA 50-6-76)

1. THIS IS FURTHER TO DISCUSSIONS WITH REFERENCE TO SS (I) 605/22 OF 22-12-75 FROM DDG (OPS) AND TO 50-52 OF 9-1-76 FROM SUPT. VAUGHAN.
2. DISCUSSIONS BETWEEN SS AND CIB MTL HAVE RESULTED IN THE DECISION THAT THE CIB AIRCRAFT WILL BE FULLY COMMITTED DURING THE OLYMPICS PERIOD AND THEREFORE CANNOT BE SHARED BETWEEN "I" OPS AND SPECIAL "O".
3. WE WOULD THEREFORE SUGGEST THAT THE "I" OPS AIRCRAFT BASED IN OTTAWA BE SHARED WITH "A" DIVISION ON A PRIORITY BASIS DURING THE OLYMPIC OR PRE-OLYMPIC PERIOD. WE EXPECT THAT THE NEED WILL MANIFEST ITSELF MORE IN MONTREAL THAN IN OTTAWA OR KINGSTON DUE TO THE HEAVIER OLYMPIC INVOLVEMENT IN MONTREAL.
4. HOWEVER, WE CONSIDER THAT THE AIRCRAFT AND PILOT CAN REMAIN IN OTTAWA ON STAND-BY TO BE CALLED TO MONTREAL ON A TWO TO FOUR HOUR BASIS WHEN REQUIRED. WE WILL BE APPROACHING THE COMMANDER OF MONTREAL BASE, D.N.D., AT ST. HUBERT, TO ARRANGE LANDING AND HOUSING FOR THE AIRCRAFT.
5. WE ENVISAGE THE NEED FOR THE AIRCRAFT AND PILOT TO PARTICIPATE IN TRAINING EXERCISES IN MONTREAL SO THAT THE PILOT CAN BECOME FAMILIAR WITH FLYING CONDITIONS IN AND AROUND MONTREAL AND TO ACCUSTOM OUR SURVEILLANCE UNITS TO WORKING WITH THE AIRCRAFT

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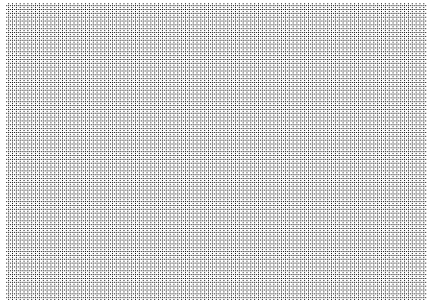
OLYMPIC VILLAGE:
