SUBJECT Summer Olympics, Montreal 76 - OBJET Threat Assessment

This has reference to your correspondence of 25 February 1975 with attachments and in particular memorandum dated 25 February re 76 Summer Olympics - Threat Assessment - (General). As discussed in recent meetings between Olympics Secretariat and "D" Operations personnel the following pertains to your submission:

- (a) Organization Threats Information on organizations of interest has been made available to you in material compiled on country profiles. Updatings and changes in the threat potential of such organizations will be forwarded to you as and when received.
- Individual Threats A photo album with pertinent data is being compiled on Arab residents in Canada who may pose a threat during the Olympics. Copies of this material when completed will be forwarded to you. the international scene we have recorded in our computer Data Center the names of approximately 7500 individuals, if we include aliases the total is approximately 20,000 names. These persons are identified with terrorist organizations as members, suspect members and/or sympa-The list includes Palestinians/Arabs, Japanese, I.R.A., South Americans, etc. Those names with further identifying data have been made available to the Department of Manpower & Immigration (M&I), for inclusion in their computer data bank (CPIC). As you no doubt are aware, M&I will be maintaining computer terminals at major ports of entry in Canada and will therefore have immediate access to records when checking out suspects. In the event of a positive identification or further clarification being required, we of course will be working in our own Operations Center at Headquarters to research and provide any other intelligence avail-

able.

- (c) New Weaponry Any new devices being used or should an upsurge in past methods such as letter bombs reoccur, the information will be shown in our weekly intelligence bulletins. Should there be any possibility that such weapons or explosives might be utilized to disrupt the Olympics you will be advised directly by correspondence.
- Documentation Over the past 4 or 5 years there have been numerous cases of false travel documents having been used by terrorists. There has also been indications of countries such as Libya and Algeria providing legitimate passports to Arab terrorists. An area which could create problems is the possibility of terrorists using lost, stolen or forged Canadian passports to enter Canada, this being the easiest way to enter this country. Another major problem is that visas are not required for Japanese or British visitors to Canada thereby making it easier for Japanese terrorists or possibly I.R.A. members to enter this country if they decide on a target.
- (e) General Threat Intelligence Any Developing trends on the national and international scene will be followed closely with any relevant material supplied to you. In this regard we are currently monitoring the present crisis in the Middle East as a breakdown in negotiations would in all probability result in an increase of terrorism around the world.
- 2. With reference to page 2 of your submission and the threat projections for individual security functions, S/Sgt. has ascertained that the Protection of Property Branch, "P" Directorate have surveyed various vital points and other key security functions in Canada and projected threat assessments for major events such as the

Olympics. A review of their material along with ongoing intelligence from the Security Service should provide the information necessary to assist in overall threat projections. Regarding items (b) and (c), concerning individual and organization terrorist profiles, these have been covered in items (a) and (b) above.
